I. DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE MEDAL.—By direction of the President, under the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (WD Bul. 43, 1918), the Distinguished-Service Medal (first Oak-Leaf Cluster) for exceptionally meritorious and distinguished service in a position of great responsibility during the period indicated is awarded to the following-named officer:

Major General Hobart R. Gay, United States Army. 8 July 1950 to 14 February 1951.

II. LEGION OF MERIT.—By direction of the President, under the act of Congress approved 20 July 1942 (sec. III, WD Bul. 40, 1942) and Executive Order 8260, 29 October 1942 (sec. I, WD Bul. 54, 1942), the Legion of Merit for exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding service during the periods indicated is awarded to the following-named officers:

Lieutenant Colonel Arthur J. Cornelson, Transportation Corps, United States Army. January 1946 to September 1948. (This award supersedes the award of the Commendation Ribbon to Lieutenant Colonel Cornelson, for service from 16 January to 5 February 1946, announced in letter from Major General A. V. Arnold, United States Army, Headquarters, United States-Soviet Joint Conference, Seoul, Korea, 6 February 1946.)

Lieutenant Colonel John C. Dalrymple, Corps of Engineers, United States Army. 9 to 29 March 1945. (This award supersedes the award of the Bronze Star Medal (second Oak-Leaf Cluster) to Lieutenant Colonel Dalrymple, for service during the same period, published in General Orders 178, Headquarters, 9th United States Army, 28 May 1945.)

Lieutenant Colonel Charles E. Leydecker, Cavalry, United States Army. November 1944 to May 1945. (This award supersedes the award of the Bronze Star Medal (first Oak-Leaf Cluster) to Lieutenant Colonel Leydecker, for meritorious service from 17 to 27 December 1944, published in General Orders 55, Headquarters, 7th Armored Division, 27 March 1945.)

III. LEGION OF MERIT.—1. By direction of the President, under the act of Congress approved 20 July 1942 (sec. III, WD Bul. 40, 1942), and Executive Order 9260, 29 October 1942 (sec. I, WD Bul. 54, 1942), the Legion of Merit, in the Degree of Chief Commander, for exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding service during the period indicated is awarded to the following-named officer:

Lieutenant General Gilberto R. Limon, Mexican Army. December 1946 to March 1950.

2. By direction of the President, under the act of Congress approved 20 July 1942 (sec. III, WD Bul. 40, 1942), and Executive Order 1900, 29 October 1942 (sec. I, WD Bul. 54, 1942), the Legion of Merit, in the Degree of Officer, for exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding service during the period indicated is awarded to the following-named officer:

Brigadier *Leslie Francis Spearman Dawes*, British Army. August 1942 to May 1944.

IV. BRONZE STAR MEDAL.—By direction of the President, under Executive Order 9419, 4 February 1944 (sec. II, WD Bul. 3, 1944), the Bronze Star Medal for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States during the period indicated is awarded to the following-named officer:

Captain *Charles G. Osburn*, Quartermaster Corps, Army of the United States. 4 September to 27 October 1945.

V. COMMENDATION RIBBON WITH METAL PENDANT.—1. By direction of the Secretary of the Army, under AR 600-45, the Commendation Ribbon with Metal Pendant for meritorious service during the period indicated is awarded to the following-named enlisted man:

Technical Sergeant *Saul D. Jacobs* (Service No.) (then technician third grade), Detached Enlisted Men's List, Army of the United States. July to December 1944.

2. By direction of the Secretary of the Army, under AR 600-45, the Commendation Ribbon with Metal Pendant for meritorious achievement during the period indicated is awarded to the following-named officer:

First Lieutenant *Sterling P. Thurston*, (then master sergeant, Service No. 14095854), Quartermaster Corps, United States Army. 1 October 1949.
