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INDIVIDUAL AND UNIT AWARDS

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I—DISTINGUISHED SERVICE CROSS.

1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 25 July 1963, the Distinguished Service Cross for extraordinary heroism in action is awarded to:

Staff Sergeant Hilliard Carter, Company A, 2d Battalion, 327th Parachute Infantry Regiment in the Republic of Vietnam, on 28 September 1966, who distinguished himself while engaged in military operations involving conflict with an opposing foreign force. Throughout the night of 27 through 28 September 1966, Staff Sergeant Carter and members of his squad conducted an ambush in the vicinity of Troung Loung, Republic of Vietnam. There was evidence of a large enemy force in the area, since Company B had been overrun on the night of 25 September 1966, suffering numerous dead and wounded. While returning before dawn to friendly positions, the point man hit a booby-trapped grenade. Disregarding his own personal safety and possibly sacrificing his life, Staff Sergeant Carter pushed the point man away and dove for the grenade, absorbing the entire blast. In so doing he saved his men from possible death and wounds. Staff Sergeant Carter lost his hands, arms, and eyesight in this act. Throughout the entire time the medics and executive officer were administering first aid to save his life, all he kept asking was, "Are my men ok?" This gallant deed was truly above and beyond the call of duty and was in keeping with the finest traditions of the military service and reflects

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great credit upon himself, the 327th Parachute Infantry Regiment, the United States Army, and the United States of America.

Major Bruce P. Crandall, Company A, 229th Assault Helicopter Battalion, 1st Cavalry Division (Airmobile), Republic of Vietnam, United States Army, for heroism while participating in aerial flight. Major Crandall distinguished himself by heroic action on 14 November 1965 in the Republic of Vietnam while serving as Aircraft Commander and Flight Commander of 25 UH1D helicopters on a combat assault and volunteer medical evacuation mission. Major Crandall's flight was lifting troops on a search and destroy mission from Plei Me, Vietnam, to a landing zone in the Ia Drang Valley, approximately 10 miles to the west of Plei Me. Four successful airlifts had been completed with no enemy activity. On the fifth and final troop lift, the landing zone came under intense enemy small arms, automatic weapons, mortar, and rocket fire as the first eight helicopters landed to discharge troops. The troops on Major Crandall's aircraft suffered six casualties, three wounded and three killed as they were exiting his aircraft. The remaining aircraft waiting to land were ordered to abort, because of the intense fire. Upon returning to his base of operations, Major Crandall learned that a request for medical evacuation had been received. He immediately sought volunteers, and with complete disregard for his own personal safety he immediately took off and led two aircraft to the area despite the fact that the landing zone was still under intensive enemy fire. He landed and proceeded to supervise the loading of the seriously wounded soldiers aboard his aircraft. Major Crandall's bravery and daring courage to land under the most extreme hostile fire instilled in the pilots the will and spirit to continue to land in the landing zone under intense enemy fire, and in the ground forces the realization that friendly wounded would be promptly evacuated. This greatly enhanced morale and will to fight at a critical time. After his first medical evacuation, Major Crandall continued to fly into and out of the landing zone throughout the day and into the early evening. He completed 14 landings on medical evacuation and resupply missions under intense enemy fire, his helicopter often times being the target of fire. He retired from the battlefield only after all possible service had been rendered to the infantry troops. Major Crandall's acts of bravery and daring courage in the face of a determined enemy were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Army.

Specialist 6 Roy E. Judkins, Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 184th Ordnance Battalion in the Republic of Vietnam, on 4 December 1968 through 8 December 1968, who distinguished himself while engaged in military operations involving conflict with an opposing foreign force. Specialist Judkins participated twice in surgical procedures involving armed and dangerous explosive ordnance. Specialist Judkins selflessly entered operating rooms to remove 40mm grenades from the extremities of wounded Republic of Vietnam personnel. He also, without regard for his own safety, entered a minefield to extract another soldier while under enemy fire. Specialist Judkins' action, personal bravery, and devotion to duty were in keeping with the finest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself and the United States Army. This order supersedes United States Total Army Personnel Command, Permanent Order 321-5, dated 17 November 1997.

Major Mark E. Mitchell, Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, 3d Battalion, 5th Special Forces Group (Airborne), United States Army, during the period of 25 to 28 November 2001, who distinguished himself while engaged in combat operations during Operation ENDURING FREEDOM. As the Ground Force Commander of a rescue operation during the Battle of Qala-I-Jangi Fortress, Mazar-e-Sharif, Afghanistan, Major Mitchell ensured the freedom of one American and the posthumous repatriation of another. His unparalleled courage under

fire, decisive leadership and personal sacrifice were directly responsible for the success of the rescue operation and were further instrumental in ensuring that the city of Mazar-e-Sharif did not fall back in the hands of the Taliban. His personal example has added yet another laurel to the proud military history of this Nation and serves as the standard for all others to emulate. Major Mitchell's gallant deed was truly above and beyond the call of duty and were in keeping with the finest traditions of the military service and reflects great credit upon himself, the 5th Special Forces Group (Airborne), the United States Army, and the United States of America.

First Lieutenant Albert C. Welch, United States Army, who distinguished himself by extraordinary heroism in action against the enemy on 17 October 1967, near Chon Thanh, Binh Long Province, Republic of Vietnam. First Lieutenant Welch's company was moving behind Company A, 2d Battalion, 28th Infantry into an enemy base camp. After 2 hours of cautious movement, Company A was devastated by enemy small arms, grenade, and machine gun fire, killing Company A's platoon leaders and seriously wounding the company commander. First Lieutenant Welch rapidly directed a perimeter defense around the Command Group and raced forward to ensure that his forward elements were tied in with Company A's rear elements. As he approached through heavy enemy fire he received a wound to the chest but succeeded in bringing several wounded soldiers from Company A back into his company's perimeter. He ran to his men to encourage and direct their fire. Ignoring sniper fire from the trees, he cannibalized damaged radios to call for artillery fire close to and on his position, while carefully avoiding the area where the dead and wounded were lying. Seeing an enemy rocket propelled grenade being launched against the Command Group, he raced forward through both enemy and friendly fire and killed the enemy soldier, receiving a serious wound to his left arm. With his sidearm, he killed another enemy soldier who had penetrated the company's perimeter. Exhausted, he slumped to the ground. His first sergeant called to him that enemy soldiers were executing American wounded. He again rose to his feet, raced forward, and killed two more enemy soldiers, then fell unconscious but still alive from five battle wounds and loss of blood. First Lieutenant Welch's heroism, care for his men, personal fighting skills, and leadership epitomized the actions of an infantry leader in close combat against an overwhelming enemy force. First Lieutenant Welch's actions reflect great credit upon himself, the 1st Infantry Division, the United States Army, and the United States of America.

2. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 9 March 1922, the Distinguished Service Cross for extraordinary heroism in action is awarded to:

Major David L. Hill, Air Corps, United States Army, who distinguished himself by extraordinary heroism in action against the enemy on 25 October 1942, while performing bomber escort duty in a P-40 aircraft over enemy held territory in the China Theatre. On this date, Major Hill attacked, without hesitation, superior numbers of enemy aircraft that were rising to intercept United States B-24 bombers. Without hesitation, he turned his aircraft on its back for a high-speed dive and placed his aircraft between enemy fighters and the B-24 bombers. With exceptional flying ability, Major Hill forced enemy aircraft to turn from the attack and dive away. With skillful marksmanship, he destroyed one aircraft and severely damaged three others resulting in their probable destruction. Major Hill's leadership, spirit, and extraordinary heroism in action in carrying the attack to the enemy without thought of the odds against himself were an inspiration to all fighter pilots. By his intrepid direction, heroic leadership, and superior professional ability, Major Hill set an inspiring example to his fellow aviators. Major Hill's extraordinary heroism and devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Army.

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3. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 3 September 1898, the Distinguished Service Cross for extraordinary heroism in action is awarded posthumously to:

Private Henry Johnson, Company C, 369th Infantry Regiment, 93rd Infantry Division, American Expeditionary Forces, France, during the period of 13 to 15 May 1918, distinguished himself by extraordinary heroism while engaged in military operations involving conflict with an opposing foreign force. While on a double sentry night duty, Private Johnson and a fellow soldier were attacked and wounded by a raiding party of Germans numbering almost 20. When the Germans were within fighting distance, he opened fire, shooting one of them and seriously wounding two more. The Germans continued to advance, and as they were about to be captured Private Johnson drew his bolo knife from his belt and attacked the Germans in a hand-to-hand encounter. Although he sustained three grenade and shotgun wounds at the start, Private Johnson went to the rescue of his fellow soldier who was being taken prisoner by the enemy. He kept on fighting until the Germans were chased away. Private Johnson's personal courage and total disregard for his own life reflected great credit upon himself, the 369th United States Infantry Regiment, the United States Army, and the United States of America.

II—LEGION OF MERIT.

2D PLATOON, COMPANY B, 1ST BATTALION, 7TH INFANTRY
26 SEPTEMBER 1952 TO 27 SEPTEMBER 1952

The 2nd Platoon is cited for extraordinary heroism in action against enemy aggressor forces in Korea during the period 26 and 27 September 1952. The 2nd Platoon, Company B, 1st Battalion, 7th Infantry Regiment, 3rd Infantry Division engaged the enemy on Outpost Cognac, Hill 199, in the Chorwon Sector of Korea in a brilliant series of actions to repel the 400-man Chinese battalion unparalleled in the history of the 3rd Infantry Division in 1952, destroying and routing hostile forces with an unrelenting drive and initiative. Because of the distance and terrain from the line of departure, units in the rear of the 2nd Platoon were unable to counterattack. The platoon held firm against the attackers, repelling the onslaught from two directions and preventing the enemy encirclement of the hill. Outpost Cognac, Hill 199, was attacked by a Chinese battalion with two companies in the assault. The Chinese Communist Force sounded the bugles as their signal to attack. They started to cut the barbed wire surrounding the hill and mounted the initial assault under their own artillery and mortar fire. The 2nd Platoon fixed bayonets at the sound of the bugles. Time after time the enemy assaulted the hill held by the 2nd Platoon, only to be repelled. In the early hours of 27 September 1952, the enemy repeated the assault on the hill and succeeded in entering the battle positions. The enemy was successful in gaining control of the trenches. The platoon engaged in hand-to-hand combat with the Chinese troops. Once again the platoon rallied and ejected the enemy from the hill, leaving many Chinese troops killed. Platoon members, including the wounded, remained on the hill until relieved at 0607 hours, 27 September 1952, by United States Forces. The terrain and tactical situation remained with United States Forces. The outstanding courage, resourcefulness, and aggressive fighting spirit of the men of the 2nd Platoon reflect the highest credit upon themselves and the United States Army.

Combat Command A, 9th Armored Division with its assigned and attached units is cited for extraordinary heroism and gallantry in combat in the vicinity of Waldbillig and Savelborn, Luxembourg from December 16 to December 22, 1944 by repulsing constant and determined attacks by an entire German division. Outnumbered five to one, with its infantry rifle companies surrounded for most of the time, clerks, cooks, mechanics, drivers and others manned the 10,000-yard final defensive line. Supported by the outstandingly responsive and accurate fire of its artillery battalion, this widely dispersed force stopped every attack for 6 days, until its surrounded infantry was ordered to fight its way back to the force. This staunch defense disrupted the precise German attack schedule and thus gave time for the United States III and XII Corps to assemble unhindered and then launch the coordinated attack which raised the siege of Bastogne and contributed to saving much of Luxembourg and its capital from another German invasion. The outstanding courage, resourcefulness, and determination of this gallant force are in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army.

Combat Command B, 9th Armored Division is cited for extraordinary heroism in combat in the vicinity of St. Vith, Belgium, from December 17 to December 23, 1944. Combat Command B, 9th Armored Division, was subjected to repeated tank and infantry attacks, which grew in intensity as German forces attempted to destroy the stubborn defenses that were denying them the use of the key communication center at St. Vith. By the second day, the flanks were constantly threatened by enemy forces that had bypassed the St. Vith area and were pushed far to the rear in an effort to encircle the command east of the Salm River. The attacking forces were repeatedly thrown back by the gallant troops who rose from their fox holes and fought in fierce hand-to-hand combat to stop the penetrations and to inflict heavy losses on the numerically superior foe. As the command continued to deny the important St. Vith highway and railroad center to the Germans, the entire offensive lost its initial impetus, and their supply columns became immobilized. By 21 December, the German timetable was so disrupted that the enemy was forced to divert a corps to the capture of St. Vith. Under extreme pressure from overwhelming forces, Combat Command B, which for 7 days had held the St. Vith area so gallantly, was ordered to withdraw west of the Salm River. By their epic stand, without prepared defenses and despite heavy casualties, Combat Command B, 9th Armored Division, inflicted crippling losses and imposed great delay upon the enemy by a masterful and grimly determined defense in keeping with the highest traditions of the Army of the United States.

92D ARMORED FIELD ARTILLERY BATTALION, 27 NOVEMBER 1950 TO 11 DECEMBER 1950

The 92nd Armored Field Artillery Battalion distinguished themselves in combat during the period November 27, 1950 to December 11, 1950, by extraordinary heroism and outstanding performance of duty in action against the enemy in North Korea. The Battalion's mission was to assist in the relief of surrounded units of the 1st Marine Division and other Army forces of the 7th Infantry Division. The Battalion supported the Marines in their attacks, as well as Task Force Dog in the area of Chinhung-Ni, North Korea, holding that area open until the surrounded forces were completely pulled out. Despite extreme cold and the absence of sleeping bags, the morale of the Battalion remained high and proud of their great effort with this mission. Throughout the march from the vicinity of Majong-Dong to Chinhung-Ni, the Task Force had to negotiate several dangerous and treacherous roadblocks of trucks and a partially destroyed bridge. The 92nd Armored Field Artillery Battalion's communications proved superior to any other and was the only reliable source of information to the Task Force Commander. On 10 December 1950, a report was received that an enemy force was on Hill 577 near Sudong-Ni, 3,000 yards to its rear. Battery B was turned about and fired on the Hill, effectively neutralizing it. Through its tremendous fire power capabilities, the 92nd Armored Field Artillery Battalion completed its mission of assisting in holding Chinhung-Ni open for the evacuation of cut-off Marine and Army units. The 92nd Armored Field Artillery Battalion's exceptional professional skill, determination, and esprit de corps under extremely difficult and hazardous conditions exemplify the highest traditions of the military service.

406TH INFANTRY, 16 NOVEMBER 1944 TO 21 NOVEMBER 1944

The 406th Infantry distinguished themselves by extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against the enemy from 16 to 21 November 1944 in Immendorf, Apweiler, and Gereonsweiler, Germany. On 16 November 1944, the 406th Infantry, as part of Combat Team "X", 2nd Armored Division, jumped off. The untried green troops were attacking Immendorf, Germany. The assault elements met rabid resistance from the dug-in enemy. Adding further hazard, enemy artillery checkerboarded troops with a sickening weight of heavy artillery, small arms, and prearranged mortar fire. The ground over which the attack was launched was studded with antitank and antipersonnel mines. After a grueling battle, the town was secured and held against four vicious counterattacks. On 18 November 1944, the 406th Infantry's next drive called for the capture of Apweiler, Germany, which was held by crack enemy troops of the 106th and 11th Panzer Grenadier Regiments of the 9th Panzer Division. Following a rolling barrage of the 380th Field Artillery Battalion, the 406th Infantry plowed into the maze of enemy defenses. Hand-to-hand fighting was the order of the day as the riflemen grappled with the enemy, often in the same fire trench, with bayonet and grenade. Enemy casualties were heavy in addition to 600 captured, which included a battalion staff intact. Enemy infantry and tanks moved up to the vicinity of Gereonsweiler on the night of 18 November 1944, and at 0530, 19 November 1944, the enemy pushed against the newly taken town. A battalion of enemy infantry plus seven Mark IV and Mark V tanks moved determinedly against our forces. Although communications were disrupted and the enemy had pierced our lines, every man held his own little piece of ground in a savage encounter. Bazookas knocked out two enemy tanks, a third was eliminated by a rifleman who crawled to the top of the tank and dropped a grenade down the open turret, and a bazooka accounted for another, while tank destroyers chalked up two more. By dawn the enemy withdrew, leaving the battlefield littered with tanks and dead soldiers. Opposite Apweiler was stoutly manned Gereonsweiler. As the 406th Infantry pushed across the open field, the enemy opened up with every weapon he possessed as one of the greatest tank battles of the war was raging in their midst. The infantrymen doggedly pushed forward until they had closed with the enemy and drove him from the outskirts of Gereonsweiler. The advance had reached the west edge of town by 1115 hours. Gereonsweiler was secured by 1400 hours, however, resistance was not completely overcome. Many isolated enemy units continued to fight. The enemy launched two vigorous counterattacks that whittled the strength of two companies to platoon size. In all these actions, every man and officer displayed outstanding courage and bravery. The men fought the enemy every minute during the bloody days the action entailed. The fighting spirit displayed by members of the 406th Infantry exemplifies the finest traditions of the United States Army and will be inscribed indelibly in the annals of the American infantry.
